

Factoid – Ageless Wonder



Clark Poelzer is the only bowler to have won tournaments while in his 20's, 30's, 40's and 50's. Clark held the CBA single season money winning record until now as in 1995-'96 he won \$5,215. Chad Nelson in 2008-2009 won \$5245.00

Factoid – Rookie Standard



Jeremy Steffan set quite a standard for CBA Rookie's of the Year setting a few rookie records. During the 2000-'01 season he won 3 titles, collected 135 points, won \$3,845, made the stepladder four times and cashed eight times

**Bruce Forsland set the record for the longest time between titles – Nov 1978 until January 2000, 21 years 2 months
Leif Carlson has the 2nd longest – June 1979 until October 1999, 20 years 4 months**

Factoid – Stepladder 300 games



Jerry Holldorf had the first CBA stepladder 300 game when he shot one at the November 1993 tournament in Eau Claire. He picked a good time as the CBA had an insurance policy that paid him \$5,000. Bob Klatt had the first ever televised 300 game at the Linds Tournament of Champions at Lynbrook Bowl in May 1997. He only won \$500 which was donated by Chris Harrison Tile Co. Tim Mayer had the other at Country Lanes in Duluth in March 1994. There was no bonus but he was part of the highest scoring stepladder match as Brad Larson shot 277. He had the first 9 also. Mark Lutchens shot the 4th 300 in the CBA stepladder at Holiday Lanes in Albert Lea, February 2008. No Bonus Either!

Factoid – Duo History



Ed (Aug 2000 at West Side Lanes) & Lee Peterson (May 1972 at The Bowler in Fargo) are the only Father-Son duo to have CBA titles. Carl & Brandon Fietek joined Clark & Carl Poelzer as the only Father-Son duo to make the match play at the same time as they made the cut at Super Bowl in July 2009. The Poelzer's made the cut together 3 times - River City Lanes September 2006, Holiday Lanes February 2007 & Stars & Strikes December 2007. Sam & Deb Lantto are the only Husband-Wife duo to make the same match play – April 2006 & April 2007 at Texa Tonka Lanes.
